



Yaw D. Yeboah, Professor of Chemical and Biomedical Engineering and Former Dean of the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering

Professor Yaw D. Yeboah is a tenured Professor at the Florida A&M University-Florida State University College of Engineering, Until stepping down in 2015, he was the Dean of the College of Engineering and Head of the Department of Energy



and Mineral Engineering that run programs in Energy Business and Finance, Energy Engineering, Environmental Systems Engineering, Mining Engineering, Petroleum and Natural Gas Engineering at Penn State University. He was also a Professor of Engineering and Associate Dean for Science and Engineering at Clark Atlanta University.

After completing his General Certificates of Education (GCE "O" and "A" Levels) at the Ghana Secondary Technical School at Takoradi, Ghana, in 1971, Prof. Yeboah received a scholarship to attend the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) where in June 1975 he became the first person to receive four separate degrees within four years from MIT: BS degrees in chemical engineering, chemistry and management, and a MS in chemical engineering. He subsequently received his doctorate in chemical engineering also from MIT. Prof. Yeboah has over 30 years of research (academic and industrial), teaching and project management experience.

Before going into academia, Prof. Yaw Yeboah worked at the General Electric Corporate Research and Development Center. His research expertise covers such areas as catalysis, bioenergy, fuel cells and energy conversion, combustion and emission control, oilfield scale formation, nanomaterials and materials characterization. He has published widely in these areas. Some of his recent research projects include electrocatalysis/nanomaterials, catalytic gasification with eutectic salts, PEM fuel cells, hydrogen from biomass for transportation and stationary fuel cell power generation, fire spread behavior in liquid pools, and use of non-thermal plasma discharge for emission (NOx) control.

Prof. Yaw Yeboah was the Library Prefect while at GSTS and is very passionate about his alma II mater. He is a lifetime Member of the Alumni Association and is the current Chair of the Board of Trustees.

Giant Wg. Cdr. William K. Kekrebesi (Rtd)



In September 1966, I entered GSTS in search of knowledge in science and technology. Our dream then was the popular – phy-ma-ma – that is, physics mathematics and mathematics: perhaps chemistry was embedded. I remember writing a protest letter in form 3 to my English teacher, Mr. Taylor about the introduction of subjects like history and biology. The expanded syllabus was put into place when Mr. DV Owiredu became headmaster, following the tenure of Mr. Adu Ampomah. While these additions helped to produce well rounded students, it could also be argued that it was the beginning of the dilution of the original mission of GSTS, which was to produce engineers and scientists to power Ghana's growing economy.

This trend continues at the national level in Ghana, at a time when STEM (Science Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) is being promoted even in developed countries like the US. Currently, the School of Liberal Arts is larger than the School of Engineering at the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology our premier science/technological university. I do not know how the situation is at MIT and this is not to say the arts and business are not important. Our problem in Ghana however is, we have totally neglected and failed to invest in science and technical education and we seem to be reaping its consequences.

We do not need any elaborate research to appreciate the fact that countries that manufacture products are richer than those still wallowing in the quagmire of consumerism. In order to prosper, a country must innovate and manufacture something. To correct this in Ghana, we need to take a second look at the educational curricula of our schools, and invest appropriately especially at specialized schools like GSTS.

Several years back, I became aware of some GSTS Giants getting together to reboot our Old Boys Association to help GSTS. This was taking place in Accra and the US. In fact, I joined the Accra group and became president until handing over to Giant George Otoo.

In the US too, Giants like Dr. Emmanuel (Lee) Idun, Mr. Ishmael Acquah, Mr. Anthony Ashon, Mr. Victor Abbey, Dr. Tetteh Abbeyquaye, Mr. Samuel Nketsia-Tabiri, Mr. Emmanuel Kofi Arthur, Mr. Mickey Dawson-Annan, Mr. Daniel Sam, Mr. John Baidoo, and many others begun the hard work of forming the US association. Today, we now have an International GSTS Alumni Association. We appreciate all these hardworking Giants whose efforts have brought us thus far.

I join you here as the first president of the GAA and on behalf of all Giants to say, Ayeekoo! Congratulations to GAA North America on this 10th Anniversary, an achievement worth applauding. Indeed we can say Ebenezer. God has brought us thus far.

You are here to support a worthy cause of sending GSTS and Ghana back to the original path of training the manpower required to launch her on the path of prosperity. 

SPECIAL GUEST OF HONOR

Giant Commodore Steve Obimpeh (Rtd)



Giant Commodore Steve George Obimpeh graduated from Ghana Secondary Technical School (GSTS) in 1961. He immediately enlisted at the Ghana Military Academy in Teshie, Ghana and after initial training, proceeded to the Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth UK for his naval training. In 1963, he was commissioned as an officer in the Ghana Navy. During his naval career, Giant Obimpeh undertook several courses including a senior officer naval course at the Naval War College, Newport Rhode Island, U.S.A.

Professionally, Giant Obimpeh served in several command positions within the Ghana Navy. This includes; Commander of Ghana Navy Ships "GNS AFADZATO" and "GNS EJURA". He also became the Naval Officer, in charge of Western Command; DPA and CSO at Naval HQ and ultimately, rose to the high office of Chief of Naval Staff (Navy Commander) of the Ghana Navy.

As a dedicated public servant, Giant Obimpeh's life after retirement from the military has been equally exemplary. Between 1982 and 1985, he was appointed Managing Director of the State Shipping Corporation. During that time, he led the successful evacuation of tens of thousands of Ghanaians repatriated from Nigeria. He then served as Minister for Agriculture from 1986 to 1992, instituting during his tenure, the celebration of "Farmers Day" as a national holiday. After six (6) years at the Agriculture Ministry, Giant Obimpeh was appointed Minister of Health. In elected office, he became Member of Parliament (MP) for the North Dayi Constituency for two (2) consecutive terms.

Cdre Obimpeh holds a Master's degree in Maritime Strategy and Management from the Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, USA. He has served on many boards including the Ghana Railways and Ports Authority Board, Ghana Armed Forces Staff College Control Board, Ghana Nautical College Council, the Board of Governors of the World Maritime University, Malmo, Sweden and the Veterans Association of Ghana.

His support and love for GSTS has also remained steadfast since his graduation from GSTS. He is one of the school's most respected alumnus and has on numerous occasions, provided various kinds of support to the school.

Now in retirement, Giant Obimpeh lives with his wife Helen and is an active member of the International Lions Club. He enjoys spending time with his children and grandchildren.

Mr. Samuel Kofi Essel. - Headmaster. GSTS



Mr. Samuel Kofi Essel's journey of excellence in teaching began after successfully completing his A-Levels at St. John's School, Sekondi in 1982. He then matriculated at the University of Cape Coast and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree (Chemistry Major) and a diploma certificate in education.

Mr. Essel taught Chemistry and Integrated Science at his alma mater, St. John's School from 1990 to 2013. At St. John's, he was noted for hard work, punctuality, team spirit, and truthfulness in the performance of his duties. His commitment to work led to his appointment as Head of the Science Department from 2005 to 2012. He went back to the University of Cape Coast for graduate studies and obtained a Master's Degree in Science Education. Aside teaching, Mr. Essel was also a patron of the St. John's Science and Mathematics Club.

He was appointed Assistant Headmaster (Academic) at the Tarkwa Senior High School in the Western Region on the 6^{th} of January 2014, with about twenty six years (26) of teaching experience under his belt. After nearly two (2) years at Tarkwa SHS, the zeal, commitment, and enthusiasm with which performed of his duties resulted in a meteoric rise; an appointment as the 22nd Headmaster of Ghana Secondary Technical School (GSTS), Takoradi.

Mr. Essel has served on the Board of Governors (BOG) of St. John's School –Sekondi. He is also the author of "Practical Chemistry for Senior High Schools (SamKofel's Series)" a popular chemistry textbook for Senior *High School (SHS) students.*

GSTS OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION TO GSTS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION - A JOURNEY THROUGH TIME

GSTS is probably the only one of the top preindependence schools in Ghana that never had a viable Old Students' Association in the real sense of the term as we know it today. And the reason is not difficult to find. Although the products of our Alma mater provided large numbers of middle and senior level personnel for the technical departments and institutions of the Gold Coast before independence and after independence, as one of only two government secondary schools in the country, the school was more than adequately resourced by the state. There was therefore, no need for Old Boys of the school or any other organisation for that matter, to provide anything for it. The school did not even have a Parent/Teacher Association (PTA).

Old Boys of GSTS got together wherever they found themselves in reasonable numbers, mostly for social purposes, to reminisce about their time in school and catch up with each other. Historical references suggest that an Old Boys' Group may have existed as far back as the early 1930s. Much later, there were such fairly informal groups at Ghana Railways, Ghana Airways Corporation, the Ghana Armed Forces, Ghana Broadcasting Corporation, the mines, Public Works Department, (PWD), Government Transport (later State Transport Corporation), Ghana Highways Authority, Architectural and Engineering Services Limited (AESL), the erstwhile Tarkwa School of Mines, the old Technical Institutes and Polytechnics, as well as the Senior Staff of the Departments of the traditional universities of the country.

Later, these groupings became a little more formalised with elected officers, but were still largely for "end of year get together" purposes. In the early to late 1960s 'Old Boys" visited the school towards the end of the academic year, usually over a weekend, to play games against the various school and house sports teams. On these visits, Old Boys usually slept among the students in their former houses (there were spare mattresses that junior boys could sleep on and the "overflows" were often accommodated by the housemasters). They also mentored the younger students or "Green Horns" or "Raws" as they called virtually everyone still in school. Because most Giants worked in departments and institutions based in Accra, it was almost always invariably, "the Old Boys from Accra are coming for the weekend". Later, "Old Boys" from the universities especially KNUST began making such regular trips to the school.

As one Old Boy who has sadly passed away used to say, "the workshops and laboratories at GSTS taught and inculcated such independence and confidence in us that, we did not need networking or "old boyism" for jobs and positions after school." According to that theory, while most of the existing Old Student Associations in Ghana got together to play the "old school tie" or networking schemes where older products "fixed" their younger school mates with jobs and positions, Old Boys of GSTS "were too proud for those games." They went out of the four walls of the school with confidence to "face the world."

Later in the late 1970s and early 80s when life began to get tough for schools and colleges in Ghana, some Old Boys and groups provided assistance to the school either as individuals or loose groups. For instance, Mr W W Dompey, then Managing Director of State Transport Corporation provided scholarships for a number of brilliant but needy students in the school for several years. Mr Tuyee who operated his own chalk manufacturing factory in Tema provided the school with chalk, free of charge, for many years. During the "famine" of the early 1980s, some pilots and engineers of Ghana Airways Corporation supplied "provisions" to the school for a period.

Other Giants have volunteered as well as provided financial and other types of support to the school to this day, often without recourse to any grouping. To mention a few more names: Giants Gyasi Adonteng '56, Ambassador G.O Kesse '58, Commodore Steve Obimpeh'61, the Late Prof. K. A. Andam '65, J N Okyere '62, Dr K Y Amoako '63'65, Kweku Botchway '64, Ofei-Bekoe '67'69, S W Y Incoom '68'70 The Late Togbui Kporku '68'70, Kwaku Osafo-Antwi '69, Samuel K Brenyah '71'73, Albert Ogyiri '72, Prof. Agyeman Badu Akosa '73, John Aidoo '72, Captain Owusu Koranteng '73, Dr Kofi Adu-Mensah '73, Edmund Obeng '71, George Otoo '74, Yaw Domena '74, Prof R.K Nkum '74'76, Emmanuel Blay '73'75, Andy Konney '77, Mr. Joseph Ashun '74, Mr. Jim Baiden '74, Dr. Nyarko-Mensah '75, Enoch Cobbinah '75, Patrick Attipoe '76, Dr Alex Mensah '78, Eric Akrofi '79, Henry Boafo '80'82, Agyabu Nyanzu '81, Ebenezer Afadzie '84, Johnson Teye '83'85, Isaac B. Clement '84, Alfred Gyan '84'86', William Adusei '89, Kwesi Abbiw '91 and many more. In fact, two of our

alumni, Gts Thomas K. Mensah '71'73 and Asford Adams '75'77 have served our school as Headmaster.

Obviously, space would not permit me to produce a full listing of all Giant supporters of the School and the Association. As members of the Association, we can only salute and thank these illustrious Giants and the many more unsung heroes of the GSTS alumni family from the bottom of our hearts.

By the mid-1980s, there was a fairly formal association in Accra for Old Boys in the Accra-Tema Metropolitan Area. Other Old Boys' groups also started in Takoradi, Tarkwa, Kumasi, and Tema. It was during that period that the then Chairman, Mr Grant Ohemeng Kesse and a few of his age group coined the accolade "Giants of the West." Which would later be shortened, "Giants," for Old Boys of the school. At that time, the Association also toyed with the idea of "Fight the good fight with all thy might," which was the final hymn that was sung at the evening service of the Sunday before final examinations began every term, as the School's Anthem.

The United Kingdom Chapter of the Old Boys' Association, although thin on numbers, was the very first one to be inaugurated outside Ghana, with Gt Dr S N Adjei (King Crole)'65'67, as its first Chairman. Like other Old Boys' Groups, a few members kept it going, notable amongst them: Gts Farouk Y. Haruna'90, Raymond Akuaku'88'91, Michael Asiedu'76, Frank Akoto'71 (Current Chairman), Otis Abekah-Mensah'70'72, Richard RM Ofori Brown'73'75 and Commander Appiah. The Group managed to attract Giants from continental Europe and was the Chapter that with the assistance of Giants Samuel Abekah-Mensah and Richard Ofori-Brown, donated the very first server and a number of computers to the school.

The Tenth Anniversary celebration of the GSTS Alumni Association (GAA), North America, could not have come at a more opportune time. Ten years ago, you embarked on a journey with ten (10) Giants to unite all

Giants in North America (USA and Canada). Your able leadership in helping to unify and reorganise the GSTS Alumni Association cannot be understated, especially as your Association has led the revival of a global association, leading to the enactment and promulgation of a new Constitution and election of its first executive committee. Arguably, it could be one described as one of the most important events in the life of the GSTS Alumni Association so far.

Also, owing to the good work that was began by your group a decade ago, several vibrant year groups and many individuals are now organising and poised to do or have done great things for the school at the present time. And in this, the tireless efforts of Gts Dr. Tetteh Abbeyguaye '89, Dr. Joseph Papa Amuah '92, Seth Ahiekpor '69, Ishmael Acquah '81, Pha<mark>nuel</mark> Markin '76, Mickey Dawson- Annan'79'81, and Irving Nemi'83'85 as well your able leadership under Gts Dr. Sam Johnson '76, Charles Kumi '76, Kwaku Nnuro '74'76, Dr. Ernest Ofori-Darko '78'80, Dr. Jonathan Abrokwah '69'71, Dr. Emmanuel (Lee) Idun '80'82, Prof. Yaw Yeboah '69,'71, Anthony Ashon '81, Emmanuel Arthur '81, Kwamena Sankah '88'90, Victor Gorman '92, Dr. Edward Botse-Baido o' 91 and many more must be acknowledged.

We need to rebuild our Alma mater for our own sake and for the sake of Ghana and generations unborn, and in this venture, all groups and chapters will be looking up to your innovative ideas and contributions. History shall record that the founders of GAA- North America, past and present Trustees, Executives and many of your active Members made a significant and indelible contribution to the GAA.



war). Not only was the school down temporarily, but the staff were required for rendering various services in connection with the war. Some of the students also entered the Volunteer Service and two actually saw action in East Africa

In 1917, the first Principal of the school, Mr. H.A. Wright, retired and handed over to Mr. Pickles. Mr. Pickles was then replaced as Principal by Mr. M. McLaren in November 1919



In 1921, new dormitories were provided towards the end of the academic year and all nonresident students went into residence. Then in 1922, work started on a bungalow for a housemaster. It was opened in 1923 and for the first time there was a resident housemaster. 1923 proved to be a year to remember, it saw the passing out of 45 students

made up of 36 woodwork students and 9 metalwork students. That same year the Old Boys Association was had no lodgings of its own. As a result of this lack of formed. Unlike the previous decade, the story of the school in the 1920s was that of overcrowding and consequently the need for more accommodation. Fortunately, the Training College was removed to Achimota College and its buildings were taken over for the extension of the Technical School. In spite of that, the school experienced acute overcrowding again both [1] in the dormitories and workshops.

School History Continued

With the school's name now changed to Government Technical School, it began receiving a somewhat unique attention from the colonial government. This stemmed from the fact that, it was the potential life-blood for the

principal industrial concerns of the Gold Coast. Its students started taking the British City and Guilds Examinations from 1933 signaling an upgrade in the courses being offered. A fourth-year was introduced before the planned transfer to Takoradi.

The buildings in Takoradi were completed in 1939 at the cost of £37,000. The site, was larger than the former, with it being sited on a 120-

hectare ground. Accordingly, packing started immediately from May 1939 and equipment from Accra were transferred by road to Takoradi during the month of June, July and August. The school re-opened in Takoradi on the 21st of September, 1939 under the headship of Mr. T. T. Gilbert. Here, its unique character became evident as students from other West Africa countries enrolled at the school. From 1940, students from Nigeria, the Republic of Benin (then Dahomey), and Sierra Leone enrolled at the school in numbers since the school was the only Technical School in the entireWest Africa region.

Just as the school began settling down in Takoradi, World War II broke out and the school had to be moved again as its premises were needed this time for the Royal Air Force. In August, 1940 the school moved to the Elmina Castle and the "Royal" Air Force occupied its

buildings. (Today a miniature nose of an airplane still hangs at the entrance of the main classroom block to commemorate the occupation by the Royal Air Force). Elmina Castle was woefully unsuitable for a school and a few alterations were required before it could house a school. Again, equipment had to be transferred; this was done in November and December of 1940 and the school re-

opened in January 1941. Only fifty (50) of the students enrolled.

Sixteen months after its relocation to the Elmina Castle, the need for training service tradesmen to support the technical branch of the colonial military caused the school to be absorbed into the technical branch of the military to support WWII. All staff and most of the students served in the military until the end of hostilities. The Royal Air Force which occupied the school's



buildings in Takoradi moved out in October 1945 giving way for the return of Government Technical School under the headship of Major T.C. Watkins, designated Acting Principal. A few of the former staff were brought back and the school started growing

again, albeit relatively slowly. In 1950 there were 110 students, compared to 80, recorded as early as 1928.

T H EM O D E R NE R A

1953 saw drastic changes with the introduction of a Secondary School Curriculum. The school then became Government Secondary Technical School. A five-year course leading to the School Certificate was initiated. The pre-1953 curriculum comprised of Engineering and Construction, with English, Mathematics and Science as background subjects.

The Secondary School curriculum added academic subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Elementary and Additional Mathematics, Geography and French. Religious Knowledge, Music and History added later, but were not offered for the school certificate examinations.

Government Secondary Technical

School had its first African Headmaster, Mr. J.V.L. Mills (who took over from the last white head, Mr. F.E. Joselin) in August 1958 and sixth-form education began in

Another landmark is the story of the military's involvement with the school. Obviously, GSTS has been involved with the military since World War 1. On 3rd November

1965 however, the late Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, first President of the Republic of Ghana announced that Government Secondary Technical School would be adopted and turned into an Air Force Training College.

"Students in the Government Secondary Technical School will be given such opportunities as are appropriate and suitable to make them potential candidate to the Air Force and even for our Civil Aviation," he said. This pronouncement was not implemented until the early 1970s when Air Marshall M. A. Otu (formerly Lt. General) and Senior Officers of the Military Division of Ministry of Defense visited the school on 23rd April, 1971 to clarify the intention of the Military's involvement in the school. In the 1972-73 academic year, a batch of Officer Cadets admitted to the Ghana Military Academy were concurrently admitted to GSTS for their two-year sixth-form leading to the Advanced Levels Certificate. Due to the changing and unstable political atmosphere, this was a shortlived experiment as no other cadets came to the school afterwards.

The academic year 1970-71 recorded another change in the name of the School. From Government Secondary Technical School, when the school ceased to be a completely government - run institution it became Ghana Secondary Technical School (to maintain G.S.T.S).

The course of the school's history in the 1970s seemed to suggest that everything had fallen in place. The curricula of the school appeared to have undergone all the relevant changes and had stabilized. The school was doing well in sports, always taking the first position in athletics and rubbing shoulders with other schools in hockey, football, basketball and the rest. There were a number of clubs and societies to take care of both the social and academic life of the students. The upward surge in the reputation of the school brought other problems in its wake. Chief among these was the pressure on the school to admit beyond its capacity, consequently stretching its f a c i l i t i e s.

Although for many years the school has been technical and science biased, the school now has an arts program. In 2009, GSTS celebrated its centenary and it can be argued that GSTS has and continues to produce some of the best students in Ghana especially in the areas of Science, Technology and Engineering. This strength is evident in the calibers of its alumni all over the world and its successes at National Mathematics and Science Competitions, Robotics Competitions, and National/International examination at ions.



HISTORY OF GSTS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION (GAA) OF NORTH AMERICA

The beginnings of GSTS Alumni Association North elected. The following Giants were elected for the America can be traced to a telephone conversation following offices: Interim President: Giant Emmanuel between two old friends, Giant Daniel Sam'81 and Giant (Lee) Idun, Interim Vice-President Giant Daniel Sam, Ishmael Abeiku Acquah '81 in 2007. According to Giant Acquah, they wondered why a great school like GSTS did not have any Alumni group in the US like some Schools from Ghana. They therefore called another classmate Giant Tony Ashon'81 that weekend who immediately bought into the idea. From that point on, they started brainstorming and agreed to meet in *Maryland for the first convention of the Association.*

None of the original organizers of the Association lived in Maryland but it was chosen because of its geographical location.

On August 18th 2007, 10 Giants met in Elridge, Maryland for what would become the first official meeting of the Association. The Giants

present were: Anthony Ashon'81 - House 1, Victor Abbey'81-House 5, Tetteh Abbeyguaye'89 - House 8, Samuel Nketsia-Tabiri'82 - House 8, Emmanuel Kofi Arthur'81- House 2, Mickey Dawson-Annan'79"81 (OT) House 6, Daniel Sam'81- House 4, Emmanuel (Lee) Idun'80 "82 - House 8, Ishmael Acquah'81- House 5 and John Baidoo'81- House 3.

The first agenda centered on a draft constitution. Giant Micky Dawson-Annan (OT) suggested and it was unanimously agreed that a draft constitution be adopted as an Interim Constitution until the group met again. To get the Association up and running some of the members present were given various assignments. Giant Acquah was tasked to get the Association incorporated as a non-profit organization and open a bank account in the Association's name. Giant Tony Ashon was tasked to develop a website. An annual dues of \$100.00 was decided and interim executives were

Interim General Secretary Giant Anthony Ashon, Interim Deputy General Secretary, Giant Tetteh Abbeyguaye, Interim Treasurer: Giant Ishmael Acquah, Interim Conference Coordinator: Giant Emmanuel Kofi Arthur.

For the Interim Board of Trustees: the following were elected; Giant Mickey Dawson-Annan (OT), Giant

> Victor Abbey, Giant Iohn Baidoo, Giant Samuel Nketsia-Tabiri. Other than the organizational structure of the Association, other discussions included the upcoming Centenary. The next Convention was scheduled for the 2nd week of August, 2008 in

New Jersey. The highlight of the day was a group picture in a custom-made T-shirt designed by Giant Joseph Assifuah of House 1; 1976-83 who could not make it himself for the meeting.

On 29th October, 2007, the Association formally received its Letters of Incorporation from the State of Florida. It also hit another milestone by being recognized by the IRS as a tax exempt non-profit organization on June 20th 2008.

Since its humble beginning, The GSTS Alumni Association of North America has seen extraordinary growth. It now boasts of more than 200 registered members from almost all States in the US and every Canadain provence. It has held Annual Conventions each year and has lived to its founding mission of helping its alma mater GSTS by funding several programs at the School.

Over our 10 years, GSTS Alumni Association of North America has found several practical ways of helping GSTS and its students. Below is a list of some of the donations and impact we have made.

CADET CORP

The GSTS Cadet Corp (Junior ROTC) is one of the remarkable student clubs at GSTS. Founded in 1954, the GSTS Cadet Corp is the oldest School Cadet Corp in Ghana. Although members are not part or expected to join the military it is not surprising that GSTS has produced some of the finest military officers in the history of the Ghana Armed Forces. GSTS North America donated uniforms and boots to the Cadet Corp to mark the Centenary Celebration of the School.

CENTENARY BUILDING ROOF

Even as we applaud the growth of the primary school educational system throughout our homeland of Ghana, we are saddened to see our network of secondary schools languish owing to lack of funding. Facilities are deteriorating, the growing population of youth are packed into overcrowded dormitories, and the problem of providing adequate sanitation continues to grow as well.

Conditions on the ground constitute a public health crisis. The situation at our alma mater, the Ghana Secondary Technical School (GSTS), reflects this Ghana-wide problem. Once the vibrant site of science and technical learning for hundreds of promising students in Ghana, facilities at this Takoradi school are in a terrible state.

Decades of neglect, inadequate funding, and overcrowding – the school's population has tripled from approximately 700 to 2,100 students over the past few years – have resulted in a steady decline of basic sanitation infrastructure such as plumbing, water supply, bathing areas, and working toilets.

If repairs are not made immediately, an outbreak of disease at the school is virtually guaranteed. We faced such a problem with a bedbug outbreak on campus at the beginning of 2016. During that outbreak, GSTS Alumni Association -North America and other school alumni went into action, helping to fund school-wide fumigation efforts and implementing a plan to ensure that an infestation does not happen on the campus again.

The bedbug problem we faced, and the current state of sanitary facilities at the school, underscores the need for immediate action to repair and replace the school's bathrooms and toilets. It would be irresponsible on our part to wait for another outbreak of pestilence or disease before acting on the critical problem of sanitation at the school.

GSTS is fortunate enough to have the technical know-how to solve this urgent sanitation problem in its community of alumni. We already have technical plans and designs in place to construct four (4) brand new, modern bathrooms and toilet areas to replace existing facilities. Each bathroom and toilet facility would cost approximately \$200,000.00.

This ambitious project is worthy, but costly. We are asking all of our alumni, friends, and supporters to help us raise \$800,000 to execute this restoration and modernization project. Your donation will go a long way toward helping current and future GSTS students thrive in a safe and healthy educational environment. These hard-working future leaders deserve no less than our full and timely support.

Ghana Secondary Technical School is exceptionally blessed in one thing. The school has produced perhaps the greatest number of engineers, architects, quantity surveyors and building professionals in Ghana. The design of these projects is a collaboration between GSTS Alumni around the world with GSTS North America spearheading this effort. CURRENT STATE OF SCHOOL TOILET AND BATH FACILITIES












CONCEPTUAL DRAWING OF NEW BATHROOM AND TOILETS
